The Volunteer Income Tax Assistance program (VITA) is a free IRS sponsored program to help low and middle income workers have their Federal and State personal income taxes prepared and filed electronically at no cost. The VITA program, through the efforts of its volunteers, also strives to ensure that customers receive all of the tax credits which they are entitled. All volunteers and preparers are certified by the IRS in the program areas as well as their official Standards of Conduct. The VITA program formally began at HCDSS in 1999. At the time it consisted of primarily processing paper returns and was loosely organized. It gradually began to take shape by 2003 and as E-Filing became increasingly prevalent. The volume of processed returns continued to increase. VITA volunteers have processed returns at DSS, at regularly scheduled intervals at Working Solutions in the evening, and additional outreach sites including Old Forge.

FROM SEWER DEPT .:



CONGRATULATIONS ALVIN! FROM HIGHWAY DEPT .:

Herkimer County Highway Awarded Three Projects Under NY's BridgeNY Program

New York State authorities have selected three of four projects submitted by the Herkimer County Highway Department for funding under the BridgeNY Program. The projects selected include: Dyke Road (CR 37) Bridge over Ferguson Creek; Bleeker Street extension (CR 241) Bridge over Ferguson Creek; and a large culvert replacement on Bleeker Street (CR 241) over a tributary steam to the Mohawk River. The total awarded cost of these projects is \$3.267 million dollars. All three projects are located in the Town of Frankfort. Highway Superintendent Mark Nagele, PE stated that these are much needed projects for Herkimer County, and since the funding is from State and Federal sources, it will have a greatly reduced financial impact on local taxpayers. Construction is anticipated to occur during the summer of 2026.

The one project submitted for consideration that was not selected was a large culvert replacement on Johnny Cake Road (CR 136) in the Town of Danube.

Herkimer County Highway Department is responsible for 574 centerline miles of county roadways, which is the fourth largest county highway system in New York State. The County also owns and maintains 67 bridges along with approximately 130 large culverts that range in size from six to twenty feet in width.

FROM SOIL & WATER:

Herkimer County Soil and Water Conservation District Fulmer and Steele Creek Water Quality Project

The District was awarded funds through Round 27 of the NYS Ag. Non-Point Source Abatement and Control Program. The project started construction in 2023, including the construction of a concrete waste storage structure, waste transfer components, and heavy use area protection for a large dairy farm in the Fulmer Creek Watershed. The Round 27 project timeline was set back by weather and failing side slopes due to poor soil conditions. The project was completed in June, and the farm is utilizing the storage to properly time and place the valuable nutrients contained in the manure on their crop fields.

SOIL & WATER CONT'D .:

Herkimer County Soil and Water Conservation District Cripple Creek Water Quality Improvement Project

The District was awarded funds through Round 28 of the NYS Ag. Non-Point Source Abatement and Control Program in 2022. The funds were for an organic dairy farm that sits atop Cripple Creek's banks. Cripple Creek contributes to the Chesapeake Bay watershed, which has a Total Maximum Daily Load (TMDL). Goals to reduce the amount of nutrients and sediment entering the Chesapeake Bay by 2025 were set by New York and other contributing states. This project and many others alike will help contribute to the goal.

The first half of the project started construction in 2023 with a covered manure storage and barnyard and was completed in January 2024. The remainder of the project consists of a second covered barnyard closer to Cripple Creek and the barns to aide in the collection and exclusion of nutrients from Cripple Creek.

Herkimer County Soil & Water Conservation District Hosts Local County Envirothon

We had our 29th annual Herkimer County Envirothon on Wednesday May 8th at Herkimer College. The event was again a huge success. Thank you to all our generous Sponsors and volunteers!

This year Central Valley Academy (CVA), Herkimer BOCES, Herkimer Central School, Mount Markham, Poland, and West Canada Valley all sent teams. Approximately 70 students participated with advisors and volunteers from NYS DEC, Farm Service Agency, Natural Resources Conservation Service, Cornell Cooperative Extension, Herkimer College, and Herkimer County Soil and Water Conservation District. The students competed in five categories: soils, forestry, wildlife, aquatics, and a current issue of "Renewable Energy for a Sustainable Future". The first-place finisher for Herkimer County was BOCES "Team 1". CVA "Team A" finished 2nd and BOCES "Team 2" took 3nd place. The top three teams will receive a plaque and each member of the 1st place team was presented with a \$50 cash prize for their achievement. CVA "Team A" was also awarded the Ray Korce Memorial Award for the highest score in Forestry, presented by Gary Miller, past forestry instructor and retired DEC Forester.

Each participant received a "2024 Herkimer County Envirothon" t-shirt designed by a local Mount Markham student, Bri Edson, and a delicious lunch consisting of pizza, chips, apples, cookies, milk, and juice. Everyone involved in the Envirothon had a great time and the teachers would agree that it was a great hands-on learning experience, focused on the conservation of our natural resources. This outdoor event gives students the opportunity to get away from the typical classroom setting and get their hands dirty with interactive science related questions.

BOCES "Team A" will go on to represent Herkimer County at the New York State Envirothon on Wednesday, May 22nd and Thursday, May 23rd at SUNY Cortland, in Cortland NY.

Three Herkimer College students enrolled in the Human Services program were recently awarded certification as CarePath™ Coaches through Mental Health Association in New York State, Inc. (MHANYS).

As part of the certification process, Alexis Lynch (Utica), Natalie Daley (Herkimer), and Samantha Childs (Ilion) each presented their interests and career aspirations in the mental health field. These topics included senior care, adolescents at risk of foster care placement, and parents in need of support for their children. Each student was awarded CarePath $^{\scriptscriptstyle \rm TM}$ certification following their presentations.

Lynch and Daley are May 2024 graduates, and Childs is planning to complete her degree in August 2024.

MHANYS CarePathTM is a non-clinical program designed to support teenagers and adults who experience behavioral health challenges. This is achieved by training certified coaches who work with individuals in recovery and their families or chosen supporters over a three-month period.

Herkimer College is the first college to partner with MHANYS to offer academic learning opportunities.

DID YOU KNOW???

4-WAY INTERSECTIONS MOST DANGEROUS

Vehicle crashes, injuries, and fatalities occur on all types of roads in all types of conditions every day of the year. The sad fact is that approximately 100 people die every day in the U.S. and about three are killed daily in New York State because of traffic crashes. A significant percentage of traffic fatalities occur at intersections.

A new study that investigated the most dangerous types of intersections in New York revealed that Four-Way Intersections are the leading type of crossroad for fatal motor-vehicle crashes. The study was conducted by personal injury law firm <u>Injured In Florida</u>, which gathered and analyzed crash data across various intersection types in New York. The data were taken from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) on fatal crashes that occurred at an intersection between 2017 and 2021.

Four-Way Intersections top the list as New York's most common intersection for deadly collisions, with 61.2% of all recorded intersection fatal crashes occurring at this type of crossroad. The analysis found that out of the total 1,642 fatal crashes examined, 1,005 were at Four-Way Intersections, higher than any other category. T-Intersections were identified as the second most common site for fatal crashes, with 565 incidents making up 34.4% of the total. Y-Intersections were the third most common among the studied intersection types, accounting for 55 fatal crashes or 3.4%.

At the national level, Four-Way Intersections are also the most common type for fatal motor vehicle crashes, with 27,335 such incidents comprising 61.8% of the total of 44,219 crashes that were related to an intersection.

T-Intersections follow, accounting for 14,778 crossroads crashes or 33.4%. Y-Intersections saw 1,079 fatal crashes, making up 2.4%. There were 200 fatal crashes at intersections with five points or more (0.45%), and 127 at a roundabout (0.29%).

A spokesperson for the law firm that did the study commented: "The study found that out of the 4,785 fatal crashes that occurred in New York over the five-year period, 1,642 happened at some type of intersection, which is 34.3%. This data is always a reminder to all road users of the importance of driving carefully, but especially when approaching any type of crossroads or intersection."
